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## ***Presidents' Report***

What started out 12 months ago as a daunting task has now, suddenly, turned into a year just gone and so it's time to reflect on where our Club has gone in this past year.

From the beginning, I wanted the Club to be much more visible in the local community and now, with branded Hi-Viz jackets, branded tablecloths, pull-up theme banners and branded flags, together with our Club shirts, we are certainly much more visible to members of the public and so I believe that this aim has been achieved!

As for major projects, we worked successfully with the other local Service Clubs (Lions and Zonta) to raise over \$14,000 towards drought relief for Qld farmers in a single evening event. This was then "topped up" by the Board to make a donation total of over \$17,000. I believe this was a truly magnificent effort on behalf of all 3 Service Clubs in a town of our size, but well done to Rotary for leading the way.

As a Club, we supported improved awareness for mental health in our community this year by hosting the "**Lift the Lid on Mental Health**" breakfast in October, but we didn't stop there. We also supported the training of almost 40 qualified Mental Health first-aiders in our local community, with 20 each in our two training courses held during January and February this year. Many thanks to Club member Jim Barnes for co-ordinating these events.

Over and above the ubiquitous "sausage sizzles" that Rotary is famous for, as well as our annual **Opera in the Vineyard**, funds raised have helped us support a wide range of charities and organisations, over 30 this year I believe, as well as supporting local youth within the Stanthorpe district. More details can be found in the Financial Report and the Youth Report, both outlined elsewhere within the Annual Report.

However, the event of which I am most proud is when our Club hosted the NSW-based Men's Health caravan (referred to as MHERV – **Men's' Health Education Rural Vehicle**) into Stanthorpe for the first time. Of the 85 men (and women!) who gave up 10 minutes of their time in those 2 days in April to see the male nurse, 4 were alerted to the **very** serious situation of their current health and they were advised to consult with a local GP **immediately**! Effectively, in those 2 days, Rotary helped save the lives of 4 locals – people who had no idea that they had a serious medical problem! Because of the exceptional turnout during the visit of MHERV and the results achieved, I've been assured that once again, MHERV will look to include Stanthorpe during its next country tour, hopefully in early-mid 2020.

So in conclusion, I feel immensely proud of our Club and what it has achieved during this past year. I now look forward to helping incoming President Fran and the future Presidents of our Club, continuing with these core Rotary values.

However, my term in Office does come with some regret. I regret that some of our long serving members found it necessary to break away from the Club to form their own Club. I regret that they couldn't reconcile with the fact that Rotary is changing, both here in Australia as well as Internationally. I also regret that they couldn't look to support the Club, the Club which had been such a major part of their lives, while it looked to modernise so as to attract new members.

This, however, gives the incoming Board, with the support of all the Club members, the opportunity to move forward and, where necessary, introduce a new and more modern vision of Rotary, while, at the same time,

retaining the core values of Rotary and its commitment to Community, both local and, where found needing, in communities anywhere around the world.

Finally, I'd like to personally thank each of my outgoing Board – my Vice President Tony Heading for his guidance and support, Secretary Melissa Pascoe for helping to fill my email 'IN' basket during the year, Treasurer Peter Klemm for his keeping such a keen eye on the Club's finances, Chair of the Satellite Club, Ann Richardson, for being my sounding board and for her help on so many projects, the support of Denise Harslett while she held the position of President Elect and to Julia Hassall, as President Nominee, for her insight on the various issues we encountered during the year. I'd also like to thank Julie Beddow, while not being on the Board, for being a major strength within our Club whilst also 'wielding the roster' for Meals on Wheels. I'd also like to thank Alec Harslett for being the Club's "Duracell Bunny", a tireless worker for all of our Rotary events and to Jim Barnes, who co-ordinated not only all of the mental health education sessions as well as the visit of MHERV to Stanthorpe and the publicity it required, but the Pride of Workmanship awards as well. And to all Club members who gave up so much of their valuable time to help make this a successful year for our Club, I give each of you my very personal thanks.

## ***Community Service Report***

The highlight of the year was the success of our Drought Relief fund raiser. Together with Lions and Zonta \$14,000 was raised. District recognised this effort with an award.

The Stanthorpe Agricultural Show and Australia Day catering went ahead as usual, however both need reviewing for next Rotary year. Meals on Wheels continues to be a big and commendable commitment. Thanks to Julie Beddow for filling the roster each time.

We helped with catering at Thanks to the Carers, Xmas Meal for Disadvantaged, Opening of Big Thermometer, Amiens History Association Celebrations, PETS, Summit Celebrations, Spooky Walk and Aldi Sausage Sizzles. The sausage sizzles became Satellite/Interact projects.

The Xmas ham wheel is well supported by the public and special thanks to Jim Baxter for his help and leadership when needed. We have also received \$2500 from RSL for seating in a public area, though this is yet to be done and there is a commitment to do some landscaping around the Big Thermometer when the drought breaks. The PET's conference was held in Stanthorpe this year and we provided the catering service.



## ***Rotary Foundation Report***

The club did not apply for a district Foundation grant this year but agreed, in principle, to support Goondiwindi RC District Grant– ‘Construction of Training Centre - Nepal (RAWCS)’. Six club members and partners participated in a reconnaissance trip with Goondiwindi RC members to Nepal last April and distributed 300 ‘Days for Girls Kits’. The club has applied for 2019-2020 district grants for ‘Days for Girls Training Support for Rural Nepali Women’ and to assist funding the upgrade of a mental health facility waiting room at Stanthorpe Hospital.

A multidistrict ‘Rotary Foundation Dinner with Bryn Styles’ at Loganholme in February was attended by some members and partners. Brynn, a past RI Director and Rotary Foundation Trustee, led a D7010 Canada Group Study Exchange team to our club and district in 2000. Members and partners also met the district Foundation grant funded Group Vocational Exchange Team from D3780 Philippines at the March District Conference and experienced their wonderful presentation.

This year, the club set a goal of US\$3,700 (37 members X US\$100 per capita) to the Annual Fund and this was achieved in December with a contribution of A\$5106. In addition, some members have made personal donations bringing the total club contribution to US\$4810.

The PolioPlus Fund Goal was set at US\$2,000 and this was achieved in December with a contribution of A\$2760. Club members, partners and friends supported the Bohemian Rhapsody Polio movie night conducted by the Warwick and Tenterfield clubs in November. Members have also made personal donations to PolioPlus bringing the current total to US\$4469. With Gates Foundation support, this will become US\$13,407 from our club for polio eradication.

Rotary Foundation cakes/puddings were again purchased and distributed to Rotary widows for Christmas. The order of 56 Rum and Brandy Fruit Cakes, 16 Steamed Puddings and 8 packs of Baked Puddings produced a A\$152 donation to The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund and generated a small profit of \$68.40 for our club.

The Satellite Club had an information presentation on The Rotary Foundation on 12 June and Centurion Towers were distributed to encourage members to personally contribute A\$100 each year and become Centurions. Currently we have 15 Paul Harris Fellow (PHF) members, 4 members of the Paul Harris Society, 17 Rotarian donors, 2 Major Donors, 10 Centurions and 2 Benefactors of the Foundation.

Thank you to all members for the continued support and participation in Rotary Foundation activities.

## ***Vocational Service Report***

During the year the vocational service committee undertook a number of rewarding events.

### *Vocational speakers and visits*

Teagan Ford from Gateway to Training informed members of the services provided to transition young people into the workforce.

Members had the opportunity to visit Stanthorpe’s Men’s Shed. It was a night of fellowship and information on the activities of this community group.

Something a little different was our visit to Pete’s Hot Rod and Resto Shop at Cottonvale- a truly unique business in our district. This was a fascinating evening highlighting the talents and passion of Pete’s family in old vehicle restoration and hot-rods.

### *St Joseph's School Junior Craft Awards*

Students in year 10 at St Joseph's School participated in the Junior Craft Awards. A high standard of project work was exhibited by these students. A presentation barbeque was held at the school where parents, students and Rotarians recognized the efforts of these students. Franco Pozzebon was presented with a trophy and prize for his project --a blanket box. Runner- up was Lachlan Mahoney. Thanks to Wiltshire CRT and Mitre 10 for donating prizes.



### *Men's Health Education Rural Van (MHERV)*

Stanthorpe Rotary Club was given the opportunity to host the free men's health van (a NSW initiative but both Goondiwindi and Stanthorpe Rotary Clubs were happy to come on board). MHERV was located in the centre of town. Over a two-day period the rural health nurse saw 85 clients, testing for blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar. He also gave advice on the tests and their results. Four persons were advised to see a doctor immediately. The number of people that presented was amazing for a small town and much higher than those in much larger towns in NSW. The club organised advertising, hosting the nurse and members acted as "receptionists". Many thanks to my fellow Rotarians for their support during the year.

### *Pride of Workmanship Awards*

The **Pride of Workmanship Awards** Presentation Dinner was held at the Queensland College of Wine Tourism in May. Eight local workers, nominated by their employers, were each awarded with a plaque recognizing the good service provided and the contribution made to the success of the relevant business. The dinner was attended by family, colleagues, employers and Rotarians. The Honorable James Lister MP, Member for Southern Downs, was the guest speaker and Mayor Tracy Dobie, Southern Downs Regional Council, presented the recipients with their awards.

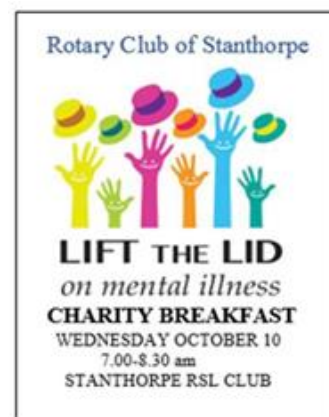
The awards were sponsored by the Bendigo – Stanthorpe Community Bank and the Southern Downs Regional Council Economic Development and Tourism Department.

### *Lift the Lid on Mental Health*

On October 10- World Mental Health Day- the Lift the Lid on Mental Health Charity Breakfast was held at the Stanthorpe RSL. Guest speaker and Mental Health First Aid trainer, Sallyanne Keevers, gave an inspiring talk on aspects of mental health and its prevalence in Australian communities. A small amount of funds was raised and donated to Australian Rotary Health for mental health research.

As a result of the response to the breakfast the club initiated and subsidised two Mental Health First Aid courses in the community. In January and February two 2-day workshops were conducted by Sallyanne. Forty members of our community are now qualified mental health first aiders.

Thanks to the RSL for the use of their facilities.



## ***Opera in the Vineyard Report***

The 27<sup>th</sup> Opera in the Vineyard was held on May 5, 2019 on a typical Autumn day on the Granite Belt.

Numbers had once again dropped from previous years despite the Opera committee attempts to revitalise the event. It was disappointing to see the drop but we were all determined to give the very supportive guests a great time.

Numbers for 2019 were 247 guests for lunch, 158 guests for dinner and 107 guests for Opera only.

Opera Queensland provided the fantastic artists Rosario LaSpina and Milijana Nikolic and both have received resounding acclaim from guests. It was a beautiful concert.

The Giving Tree and the new Diamond fundraiser were both hugely successful despite the drop in guest numbers. The Opera committee had speculated that we might not be able to sell all of the tickets, but this just simply did not happen. Money was raised for Hummingbird House and Trachoma Research.

From my personal point of view, the volunteers worked well to get the job done (as we always do) even despite the "happenings" within the club. The pre event working bees ensured that there was not too much to be done on the Saturday prior and on the day we were all well prepared and ready to put on a great show.....and we did.

On Monday after the Opera, we had a short de brief and apart from a few issues with the catering (nothing that cannot be solved) I think the response was overwhelmingly positive.



# ***Satellite & Youth Report***

The Rotary Satellite Club of Stanthorpe Flexitime has a 2 year cycle of planning and operation. In this Rotary year the Satellite Club took on the responsibilities of Rotary Stanthorpe's Youth committee. This report summarises progress towards the 2 year goals established in July 2018 from results of member surveys and consultation.

Goal 1: Consolidate our club image, celebrate the diversity between the Stanthorpe Rotary Clubs and build our collaboration with the Monday Club.

Progress:

- Net membership gain of 1. Target by June 2020 =15
- Closer ties established between Monday club and Satellite Club through board representation, occasional attendance at Monday nights and combined participation on community events
- The Club is establishing its own ways of working and identity– closing with the 4 Way test has been adopted as a Rotary tradition worth acknowledging; monthly meetings rather than weekly are recognised as unique to club and successes in youth arena

Increasing membership and retaining members continues to be an underlying focus for the next year. Increased members will improve efficiency at achieving project goals.

Goal 2: Consolidate our club structure and organisation

Progress:

- Monthly business meetings are structured and productive. All members contribute to Email Ed and development of projects. Fun spot and dinner inclusions contribute to fellowship.
- In January, members adopted the policy of LESS MEETINGS – MORE SERVICE
- Individual members are taking on more responsibility for business components of the club as needs arise.

The main organisation need is a budget for the Satellite and Youth projects for the next year. Plans also include a 5 year strategic plan and re-establishment of the Executive.

Goal 3: Build our community service focus of supporting local youth

Progress:

- Spooky Walk is established in the community calendar after the 2018 community family event attracted over 450 children (50% more than 2017) and raised nearly \$3000. Club resources were expanded using SDRC grant money. 2019 — “Magical land of wizards and wands” theme plans for increased patrons, new activities and environment and community partnerships established with Zonta, Lions, etc Sponsorship from McDonalds has been accepted.
- Youth projects:
  - Interact progressing successfully – 15 members (increase by 2. Toastmasters course in progress, first community service activity held – Aldi BBQ, assistance at Opera and Spooky Walk.



- Youth programs:
  - A trial program for the 2019 RYPEN 100% Scholarship process was highly successful – 4 candidates sent at full subsidy by us and 3 other clubs.
  - YEP inbound – Marie – successful experience for student, host families, Rotarians and school.
  - YEP outbound nominee – no response from District yet.
  - Board approved extension of scholarship trial to 2019 RYTS and RYLA
- Rotary Literacy books – trial through the Summit State School during 2019.
- Club was approached in May to apply for a \$5000 local Dominos grant to support a new project under one of their pillars. Our application for a Youth Leadership and Entrepreneurship project (built around Rotary Stanthorpe youth scholarship program) has progressed to their grant board phase.

Rotary Stanthorpe (Monday, Satellite and Interact Clubs) have supported the Chair's personal goal to contribute to End Trachoma by 2020 in Australia. In 2018-19, over \$5500 (and a very large box of used stamps for resale) has been contributed to this project. Thank you.

The Club plans to complete a member survey in July to identify continuing areas for growth and development.

## *Interact Club*

The Stanthorpe Interact Club meets every second Tuesday in the Granite Belt Learning Centre at Stanthorpe State High School. At the beginning of the rotary year, we had an election to vote in the Executive Committee, which consists of a President, Secretary, Treasurer, Community Service director and Club director. The President was Tessa Pascoe, Secretary was Alex Linton, Treasurer was Ilia White, Community Service director was Amber Weston and Ryah Frith as the Club director. The members of the Interact Club were very involved with the assistance of Opera in the Vineyard and Spooky Walk as well as having their own sausage sizzles out at the front of Aldi to support farmers in drought.

Currently we are undertaking a Toastmasters course to help us 'find our voice' and provide us with confidence in school as well as in the community.

I would like to thank Rotarian Ann Richardson and Teacher Miss Kaylah Adams for begin amazing mentors for Interact Club in this Rotary year. We have had a lot of fun and learnt a lot and I hope that we will have just as much fun next year with our new President Indyana Walters and her team of executives.
